# QUESTION OF THE WEEK/REFLECTION

# The 4th Sunday of Advent: Jesus & Mary

As human beings, we are not just random creatures, we are known by God and each other, we have our own name. Most of us also took the time to find the name of a saint that inspired us to want to emulate, and we chose the name of that saint at our confirmation. So, what is the significance of Jesus' name? The name Jesus is the Greek form of the Hebrew Yeshua, which means 'YHWH (the Lord) is salvation'. The first Joshua, the successor of Moses, saved the people from their enemies. The second Joshua (Jesus) will save the people from their sins. Jesus' calling is to save his people from their sins and to manifest God's presence. It is interesting that Matthew's Gospel begins with the promise that Jesus is the Emmanuel "God-with-us." He will end the Gospel with the promise that Jesus will be with us "always, to the end of the age" (28:20). Matthew understands that in the life, death, and Resurrection of Jesus of Nazareth, God is with us, reconciling the world to Himself. The real event of Christmas is that God comes to change the world and each of us; not just through a historical, virginal conception and a baby lying in a manger, but through the God Who is with us today. He is with us and gives us the grace to lead a life of goodness and holiness, of self-giving and selflessness as he comes to destroy selfishness and our slavery to sin. Let us then rejoice in Jesus, God's gift to us.

Even though we receive Jesus as God's gift to us in many ways: through the Church, through prayer, the Word of God, the Sacraments, and especially the Eucharist; we may think that fulfillment and happiness only comes through "doing my own will." And that "it's what I want that matters," or believe that happiness lies in having no commitments or responsibilities and no one to answer to. However, in Mary we find something completely different. She didn't say to the angel, "Sorry, but I have my own plans. I want to do my will." She said, "It's not what I want, but what God wants that matters. Let what God wants be done to me."

Mary made a complete gift of herself to God and accepted the task he gave her. Even though she did not understand all the implications, she trusted that God would give her all the help she needed. We can also follow in the footsteps of Mary, realizing that God desires our good, and that we will also find happiness in doing the will of God by welcoming Jesus into own daily lives as well. Let us also put our trust in God that he will give us all that we need in our lives as well.
