## QUESTION OF THE WEEK/REFLECTION

#### What Does it mean to be Catholic?

In the times we live in, this is an extremely important question, especially with leading figures in our society who claim the name 'Catholic' and profess to be such. What exactly does it mean to be Catholic? The Catechism gives us a kind of definition: "[A person who is] fully incorporated into the society of the Church... possessing the Spirit of Christ... who - by the bonds constituted by the profession of faith, the sacraments, ecclesiastical government, and communion - are joined in the visible structure of the Church of Christ, who rules her through the Supreme Pontiff and the bishops" (CCC 837). When you read this, you may understand the complexity of what it means to be Catholic. What is more, the Catechism also mentions the need for perseverance in "charity" to be saved. The virtue of charity is something that must be received from God and carried out in our daily life, because a person may "indeed (be) in the bosom of the Church, but 'in body' not 'in heart.'"

For a person to live as a Catholic, they must adhere to all that the Catholic Church teaches, believing that the Church, founded by Christ, is guided and supported by the Holy Spirit. This we can understand, was God's plan for the Church, since all the heresies, difficulties, and issues that she has faced throughout the centuries, could not have been resolved through the gospel alone.

When someone turns from or rejects the teachings of Jesus Christ or the Church, it is true that they may remain in the Church, but by their actions they show that their heart is far away from God. A person will always remain part of the Church whether they choose to live the faith or not. However, could they truly be identified as a Catholic? To better illustrate this, I will draw from an analogy I used in a homily once: 'If a person were called, "an artist," the truth of that statement would depend upon the fact that he/she actually made works of art of some kind, using some type of medium, for example: oil paint, sculpture, etc. If they did not, could they truly be called an artist, even if they studied art for years? Without anything to prove it, we would be compelled to conclude that the statement is not true, they are not an artist. We can make the same argument for a "Catholic." If a person were baptized and confirmed but they do not go to Church, or if their actions contradict what the Church teaches, we could say that they are not living up to what it means to be "Catholic." This is the case of certain politicians, who openly reject the Church's teachings, especially those regarding when human life begins (see Catechism #2271, among other church documents). Can such a person be called Catholic? Can the words be true in reality?

To live the Catholic faith in our world is difficult, that is why God gives us the Church, a people united by Jesus through its beliefs and the truths it testifies to. He also pours out his grace upon us. Let us pray for the Church and for each other and do our best to stay close to God by living our faith daily. Not by words only, but by actions that demonstrate our love for Jesus and our desire to follow him. Fr. John
